WORK ETHIC

Work Ethic is a set of values based on the moral virtues of hard work and diligence. It is also believed that it enhances character. Workers exhibiting a good work ethic in theory should be selected for better positions, more responsibility and ultimately promotions. Workers who fail to exhibit a good work ethic may be regarded as failing to provide fair value for the wage the employer is paying them and should not be promoted or placed in position of greater responsibility.


If you want to be successful you need to have good work ethics.

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The Sun and Skin Cancer



During the past decades doctors have become increasingly aware of the increase in skin cancer in the United States and that all people need to protect themselves from ultraviolet radiation (UV). The

harm caused by UV includes premature aging (such as wrinkling and age spots), skin cancer, and permanent, sometimes blinding, damage to eyes. Other medical conditions, such as lupus, can be made much worse by UV exposure. In addition, many people take drugs, such as antibiotics, during the past decades doctors have become increasingly aware of the increase in skin cancer in the United States and that all people need to protect themselves from ultraviolet radiation (UV). Doctors everywhere agree that education is critical to stopping the epidemic of sun related diseases - especially skin cancer.

Given the epidemic of skin cancer in this country, sun safety should now be an important part of our lives. Sun safety policies and strategies should be found in our homes, schools, work areas and recreation spots. They should be used daily by people of all color, and particularly those with fair skin and light eyes.

Sun safety should include methods of sun protection (which will help prevent skin cancers and premature aging) and methods of skin cancer detection. The combination will, as evidenced in Australia, help slow the epidemic of skin cancers, particularly melanoma.

Further, there are many easy to use products that will help make your life sun safe. <u>Sun protective clothing</u>, including hats, <u>sunglasses</u>, <u>sunscreens</u>, <u>umbrellas</u>, <u>sun shades</u>, awnings, canopies, <u>window film</u> or UV film, all will

help protect you from ultraviolet radiation. It is important, however, that you familiarize yourself with how to best combine sun protection methods, what the standards for sun protection apply to each product and how best to use each product. For example, sun protective clothing should offer a UPF of 30+ and therefore block 97 percent of UV. Sunscreens are best if they are broad spectrum and have a SPF 30+. You should also know that all sunscreens should be applied 20 minutes before being exposed to the sun and should be reapplied every two hours while exposed.

Adults should use UV protection daily. Skin cancers can be triggered at any time, and damaged skin from childhood exposure may be more vulnerable. Further, some damage can be reversed by using sun protection. Adults should routinely check their skin.

Outdoor workers and baby boomers are at high risk for skin cancer. Outdoor workers should always use UV protection and check their skin. They should also talk to their employers about strategies for sun protection. Baby boomers and seniors should use sun protection and check their skin regularly as skin cancer is more likely to occur in older age groups.

Billings-All classes will be held at the Wingate Inn, 1801 Majestic Lane, unless otherwise noted.





It's time to check your cards

Well it's early spring and we are all thinking it's time to go back to work. You need to check all your certification cards and make sure they are all up to date. The time to check your cards are not your first day of work, it's now. If you need a class, check the schedule and get signed up today so that you are ready to go to work when they call you. Being prepared is very important to you and your future as a laborer.

DON'T FORGET!!







An annual refresher—also valid for the same time period—is required to keep the certification in effect. That refresher is 4 hours in length and will be offered during the spring of 2008.

If you do not attend a refresher prior to your expiration date, you will be required to take the entire 8 hour course again.

Why do you need to keep your certification current? Because the refineries have said they will continue to require that card for anyone who works in their facilities.

<u>Traffic Control Technician and Traffic Control Supervisor classes.</u>

Have you been flagging or driving pilot car for sometime now, and would like to take the job a step farther. The Traffic Control Technician Class (TCT) would really be beneficial to you. As a laborer on highway jobs you have a lot of responsibility and a lot of different jobs that you are expected to do. You will help set signs, put in tapers, set up detours, lane closures and many other set-ups for controlling traffic. You will also have other responsibilities like giving the flaggers and pilot car drivers a break. The class will help you be prepared for the job. It is 8 hours long and is a prerequisite for the Supervisors class. In the class we will go through fundamental principles, components of the Temporary Traffic Control Zones, Traffic Control Devices, Installation and removal of devices, and more. The Supervisor class is a 16 hour class that consists of Traffic Control Standards, Designing a Traffic Control Layout, Plan reading, Supervisory skills and more. To



take the Supervisor class you must have 2000 hours of experience in traffic control and a current flagging card. If you are interested in either class, sign up now by calling the Training Center.

Drug Testing Program

Most Traffic Control contractors require you to have a current drug free laborer card before being dispatched to the jobsite. To have a current card one must have been tested during the month of December 2007 or have had a test during the 2008 calendar year. If you have not tested since November 2007, you will need to retest for this year. Your participation in the Drug Free Program is voluntary. If you decide that you do not wish to participate you are still eligible to be dispatched to contractors who do not require our test as a condition of employment. Well over 100 of you have not taken your tests as of this writing. We are not sure if you are not interested in flagging, did not get vouchers, or have lost them. If you are interested in traffic control, flagging or pilot car driver work please call the dispatch office at 1-800-980-1686 or the training center 1-800-408-9766 and we will get you set up to test.

The members who have completed our test will be automatically enrolled in the random pool. Some of the contractors have their own random pool also. This means some of you will be enrolled in more than one pool.

One final reminder is for all of you who go out to flag please carry your flagging card with you. They will be asking to see them.
